



Substantial renovation work at the Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut

The hill of Notre-Dame du Haut is an outstanding place for architecture, where Le Corbusier rebuilt the Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut in 1955 after it had been bombed to ruins in 1944.

It has been protected as a historical monument since 1967 and it was inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List in 2016, among 17 other architectural works by Le Corbusier. The Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut will undergo significant renovation work from 2021 to 2024.

Repair work to preserve the site

Since being built in 1955, the Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut has not undergone any repair of the concrete which has been damaged over time.

Various types of damage include: surface scaling (the surface mortar flakes off as a result of oxidized iron rods inside the reinforced concrete structure), structural cracks in the walls, lack of watertight integrity, fragile window glass.

All these elements will be largely overhauled everywhere in the Chapel. The repair works will also address water leaking problems in the two houses also built by Le Corbusier on the hill.

An ambitious undertaking

This extraordinary undertaking will take three years. Every outside wall will be treated, as well as the inside of the Chapel and the two houses. The complete project will be divided into five parts.

The first part of the renovation work, also called firm part, will deal mostly with restoring the Southern façade and the underpart of the hull of the roof. This part of the works will conserve the Pilgrim's Shelter and the Chaplain's House, which are scheduled to undergo later renovation work.

To guarantee the scientific expertise required to renovate a building of such international value, the Ministry of Culture set up a committee of experts including State services, curators and historical monuments specialists, members of laboratories specialized in renovation, the chief architect, the AONDH, and the Le Corbusier Foundation.

Funding

Given the significant cultural heritage of Le Corbusier's work, as an exceptional measure public funding will meet 90% of the total cost of the repair work: 50% will be funded by the DRAC, and 20% each from the Burgundy Franche-Comté Region and the Département of Haute-Saône. Funding this ambitious project goes beyond the usual needs of the site. To ensure it can fund the remaining 10% of the costs, the association which owns the Chapel has set up a fundraising partnership, with the help from the Fondation du Patrimoine. Such donations are necessry to make the repair programme possible.

Visiting the site during the restoration campaign

The Porterie Notre-Dame du Haut Porterie, the management entity of the hill, proposes a cultural action plan allowing visitors to discover the the restoration campaign and to visit the place in the best conditions.

THE HISTORY OF A UNIQUE SITE

Situated in the Southern part of the Vosges Mountains, in the Département of Haute-Saône, the sanctuary of Notre-Dame du Haut is a major spiritual, architectural and popular tourist site in the Burgundy Franche-Comté region.

Le Corbusier's first visit

The building, which has been fairly well known from the 19th century, underwent successive transformations and extensions before it was finally burnt down after being struck by lightning in 1913. Rebuilding of the Chapel started in 1924 and was completed in the 1930's. It was destroyed again in 1944 as the Allies advanced and liberated the town of Ronchamp. Le Corbusier, who was asked by the Sacred Art Committee of the Diocese of Besançon to rebuild it, arrived on the site in the Spring of 1950.

Struck by the beauty of the place and assured of his total artistic freedom by the project managers, the architect set to work immediately. He drew the first sketches in May 1950, and André Maisonnier was entrusted with the drawing of the plans and the management of the building site. The Chapel and the adjacent buildings were inaugurated on the 25th June 1955.

The Chapel became famous worldwide very quickly, and visitors from around the world have come to Ronchamp ever since. Up to 70,000 tourists and pilgrims visit the site every year.

Key figures

A private site

The site of the Hill of Notre-Dame du Haut has been privately owned by an association since 1799. As a consequence, today, the Association Oeuvre Notre-Dame du Haut (AONDH, association recognized as serving the public good according to the 1901 law) owns the land (17 ha) and building property, works by Jean Prouvé and works by Le Corbusier listed as Historical Monuments and 20th century Heritage. The Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut is an integral part of the 17 works by Le Corbusier which were inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List on July 17th 2016.

The AONDH makes sure that the spiritual quality of the hill is respected and is in charge of the protection and of the dissemination of the architectural works. The association entrusts its management branch la Porterie de Notre-Dame du Haut with the task of organising the public reception and the cultural and tourist development of the site.

ANTIQUITY

The site is occupied by the Romans for strategic reasons.

1799

The site is bought by about forty families from Ronchamp: the hill of Notre-Dame du Haut becomes private property.

1950

First visit of Le Corbusier on the hill.

1967

The Chapel is listed as Historical Monument.

1999

The Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut is the first site in Franche-Comté to be designated a 20th century Heritage Site.

2006

AONDH and nuns of the order of St Clare meet Renzo Piano. The new project is launched.

2016

The Chapel is inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List among 17 other sites.

11th CENTURY

Oldest mention of a pilgrimage in Veneration of the Virgin Mary.

1944

The site is bombed to ruins at the Liberation.

1955

The new Chapel is inaugurated.

1975

Jean Prouvé builds the campanile.

2004

The Chaplain's House and the Pilgrim's Shelter are listed as Historical Monuments as well as the inside furniture and the Peace Pyramid.

2011

The monastery of St Clare and the Porterie designed by Renzo Piano are inaugurated.

WHY RENOVATION WORK ON THE CHAPEL?

The Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut by Le Corbusier, inaugurated on the 25th June 1955, has not undergone the appropriate repair of the concrete used in the middle of the last century, which has been damaged over time.

All buildings need permanent maintenance according to the evolution of their materials over time.

Various kinds of deterioration include:

Surface scaling: the surface mortar flakes off as a result of the corrosion of steel reinforcing.

Structural cracks are due to chemical reactions inside the materials used in the concrete mix or poor construction practices.

The Southern façade was made by projecting concrete on an iron framework. This technique was quite new at the time. It requires a deep understanding of how the concrete will react over time to the thermal stresses caused by extreme seasonal temperature variations.

Watertight integrity needs to be monitored at all times. The contact between different materials causes joints to be fragile.

The window panes are also fragile elements. The various glass types, the cold or hot technique used for the writings and drawings account for this fragility. They are also vulnerable to vandalism or accidents.

The building was repainted regularly until 1995.

As a consequence, the roughcast has been overloaded with paint and needs to be cleansed before receiving the matt white coating originally provided by whitewash.









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RENOVATION SCHEDULE

The buildings

The renovation work will deal with the three main buildings of the site: the Chapel of Notre-Dame du Haut, the Pilgrim's Shelter and the Chaplain's House.

The Chapel was listed as Historical Monument only twelve years after it was built, on the 8th November 1967. The two adjacent buildings were listed as Historical Monuments on the 11th June 2004. A first study made in July 2011 enabled to assess the cost of the renovation of the three buildings.

In January 2015, a series of studies examined the different techniques to cleanse the facing and to open the cracks, they identified the repair materials and studied how to protect the window panes. They made it possible to find renovation methods.

The intervention program is divided into 5 parts: 1 firm part and several optional parts

The firm part Until July 2022

The firm part concerns essentially the restoration of the south façade and the underside of the hull. This restoration will begin with a topographic survey of the building's volume and the and the very precise identification of the cracks. The results of the experimental interventions carried out since 2015 will make it possible to validate and refine the intervention protocol if necessary.

Then, the cracks and oxidized metal lattices will

« The complete project will be divided into five parts: 1 firm part and 4 optional parts. » be treated. The waterproofing will be restored and reinforced. The cladding will also be treated and repainted to make it look as close to the original state as possible.

It should be noted that this phase will be the occasion to carry out conservation measures on the Pilgrim's Shelter and the Chaplain's House pending their subsequent restoration

Optional part 1 From October 2022 to November 2022 Restoration of the west façades.

Optional part 2

From October 2022 to December and March 2023

Restoration of the east façade of the chapel.

Optional part 3 From March 2023 to August 2023

Restoration of the south-west tower of the chapel.

Optional part 4 From January 2024 to July 2024

Restoration of the chapel's interior.

Optional part 5 From July 2024

Restoration of the Pilgrim's Shelter and the Chaplain's House.



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MANAGEMENT OF THE PROJECT

A committee of experts

A committee of experts was set up under the authority of the Conservation of historical monuments. It includes State services, curators and historical monuments specialists, members of laboratories specialized in renovation, the chief architect, the AONDH and the Le Corbusier Foundation.

The committee of experts recommends studies and surveys for a better understanding of the building in order to solve problems. The chief architect of historical monuments explains the results of the studies and suggests renovation methods to the committee of experts.

The role played by the Le Corbusier Foundation

The Foundation, in accordance with its statutes and its missions, has devoted all of its resources to the conservation, knowledge and dissemination of Le Corbusier's architectural and intellectual work.

In the committee of experts the Foundation is represented by its Director and by its architect, who is in charge of monitoring the work.

The Foundation appoints two experts, a historian of architecture specialized in Le Corbusier's work and an architect who has a good knowledge of the previous renovation works monitored by the Foundation.

The management committee

The management committee, directed by the Préfet, validates the funding after the renovation work has been presented by the chief architect and the committee of experts.

The management committee includes State Services: Direction régionale des Affaires culturelles of Bourgogne Franche-Comté, the authorities of the Région and the Département, the Fondation du Patrimoine, the chief architect, the committee of experts, and the contracting authority.

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PRESENTATION OF THE FIRM PART

Preliminary work

This part of the works will start with three different elements.

The first one will consist in protecting the adjacent buildings, the Pilgrim's Shelter and the Chaplain's House, to provide temporary watertightness, before undergoing later renovation work in optional part 4.

The second one will consist in mapping very precisely the outside and inside volumes of the Chapel thanks to a drone.

The third one will consist in the preparation of the future works by assessing the experimental work already done and by observing the result of past renovations to understand their evolution since 2015.

Restoration of the Southern façade

The restoration of the Southern façade starts with the precise mapping of the cracks before treating the facing. To cleanse the facing, as a result of experimental work, the method will consist in taking off the surface layers with a chemical stripper and sanding down very finely the bottom layers.

The cracks will be opened on a narrow width with a milling machine to reach the iron rods or the iron mesh and apply anti-corrosive coating.

The cracks will be sealed first with a flexible joint sealant against water leaking and then with finishing mortar similar to the facing. The painting will provide watertightness and the matt white aspect of whitewash.

Restoration of the underpart of the hull of the roof:

The most frequent problem with reinforced concrete is surface scaling. It is caused by the swelling of oxidized iron rods when they are too close to the surface. Indeed, hairline cracks cause leakage problems which reach and oxidize the iron mesh. The problem is treated with limited renovation after having applied anti-corrosion coating to the iron.

FUNDING OF THE RENOVATION WORK

Given the significant cultural heritage of the buildings, the management committee with all its members, local, regional and State Services-Services directed by the Préfet of Haute-Saône, has been working since 2017 to identify the renovation schedule and the funding.

Along with the State, the local and regional authorities conserve this cultural heritage.

All the partners are fully aware of the importance of this unique architectural site and give their unreserved support to the conservation works.

As an exceptional measure public funding will meet 90% of the total cost of the repair work:

50% will be funded by the DRAC 20% each from the Burgundy Franche-Comté Region and the Département of Haute-Saône.

The association which owns the Chapel is to fund the remaining 10% cost.

The total cost of the renovation works will reach 2.3 million euros.

As a result, the cost paid by the association will be 230,000 euros.

RESTORATION OF THE SOUTH FAÇADE February 2022

The first phase of the restoration campaign will begin in the first half of March 2022

After a scheduled program that was hampered by health constraints throughout 2021, the scientific committee that oversees the vast restoration campaign of the Notre-Dame du Haut chapel met on 15 February 2022 in Ronchamp. The packed agenda addressed the various phases of the campaign for this architectural gem of Le Corbusier's work, built 1955 in Ronchamp, in the Haute-Saône department, serially listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site since July 2016.

Restoration of the south facade

At the end of this day of intense work, the committee validated the start of the firm part of the project in the spring of 2022. Thus, the Albizzati company will intervene from the first half of March, to carry out the stripping of the south façade's wall, by an innovative technique combining the use of a chemical component and a mechanical sandblasting to respect the initial projected coating. This first operation will allow a study of the raw concrete surfaces to determine the most appropriate way to intervene on the pathologies and validate the treatment protocol for the cracks, spallings and exposed steel before the waterproofing treatment and repainting to restore an aspect close to the original while respecting the natural aging of the monument.

A restoration campaign as well as a research program

All stages of the work will give rise to studies that will allow a better understanding of the construction and life of the building. Thus, the scientific committee will also work on the analysis of the painted windows ('vitrages') and the waterproofing of the hull while the Albizatti company will work on the south façade.

The sum of this research and operations will allow very

close work on the monument, to specify the intervention protocols and provide relevant knowledge for future generations. And to guarantee the respect and preservation of this exceptional construction.

A 2.3 million euro restoration campagin

This vast restoration program will cost 2.3 million euros. The participation of the French state and local authorities is exceptionally raised to 90% of the cost of the work. The DRAC, a decentralized government department under the Ministry of Culture, is financing 50% of the costs, the Burgundy Franche-Comté Region and the Haute-Saône Department are each contributing 20%. It remains for the AONDH, the not-for-profit owner association, on its own funds to assume the load of 10% of the financing.

To undertake this ambitious project, the AONDH has joined forces with the Fondation du Patrimoine (Heritage Foundation) to organize fundraising. Professional and private patrons can support the project directly from the Fondation du Patrimoine's website. Other patrons, such as the Crédit Agricole, have already mobilized.
